

Trip to Mexico

The first part of the community winter retreat was spent in Mexico with our Mexican Benedictine Sisters. The time was divided between the Guadalupe Center in Cuernavaca and the Casa Central (the Sisters' Motherhouse) in Mexico City. The brothers joined with the Sisters for times of prayer, lively discussions and recreation, as well as delicious meals.

A memorable event in the midst of the quiet retreat days was a bus trip to the neighboring State of Tlaxcala. A group of the Mexican Sisters accompanied the brothers to the office of the Human Rights

Commission in the center of the lovely capital town of Tlaxcala. There, the coordinator of the Center described the appalling situation of human trafficking of young women, a problem that reaches far beyond the borders of this region.

From the city we continued on to visit the archaeological excavation at Cacaxtla, a national

historic site dating from around 500 CE. A friendly and knowledgeable guide walked us through the elegantly ramped ruins while she described the fascinating culture of the Teotihuacan, Tontonac and Maya peoples who came together at this site for trade and ceremony.
