While the brothers in Mexico had wonderful exchanges with our Benedictine Sisters and the people they serve, we three in Weston had opportunities to spend time with brother Robert, with brother John's sister, Marie, and her family in Burlington, and with friends in Weston. The Sunday Agape celebrations with the gathered friends in Weston were especially rich and encouraging.

Such experiences help us grasp the deep presence of the Spirit in our lives that unites us as a community beyond the separations and absences that are an inevitable part of our human journey.
